I am looking forward to meeting all involved with Welfare and hope in time I will be of assistance.


The Veterans Vintage Car Run will be on Saturday the 5th December 2015 at 1.30pm, so please make sure your name is on the list to enable cars to be organised.





GORE INDOOR BOWLS


Indoor Bowls season ended in August, with a busy few months. Some members playing 3 and 4 nights a week as well as some weekends.


That pretty much rounds our year up! On behalf of myself, committee and members, we would like to wish you all a very happy and safe Christmas. See you all in February.


To the RSA, I would like to thank them for their support and the raffle nights, without that, it would make the units work harder, so thank you to the RSA and the committee.

THE PADRE PONDERING

On the 11th November at 11am we again commemorated "*Armistice Day*" with a "*Remembrance Day*" service at the Gore Peace Memorial and it was great to see so many people in attendance, and especially pleasing to have quite a number of pupils from St. Marys School present.

Unfortunately because of exams, head pupils from our two High Schools were unable to be present to hold our two Anzac

Flags and due to an issue with keys and time constraints we were also unable to parade the 4 flags representing the Army, Navy, Air Force and Merchant Navy.

However we did have an ATC Cadet who proudly held the solitary NZ flag at our Remembrance Day service, and in the scheme of things this was rather appropriate as people of NZ are about to vote on an alternative flag which to be pitted against our current flag in a referendum next year.

Whilst thinking about what I was going to write for this issue of "*The Wire*" I thought it might be appropriate to include the comments which I made at that service, as follows: -

101 years ago the First World War had been raging in Western Europe since August 1914 and an advance party of NZ Forces had its first success with the capture of German Samoa on the 29th August.

On the 16th October the NZEF Main Body left NZ and reached Egypt where they camped and trained before their first combat of war on 3rd February 1915 when they assisted in the defence of the Suez Canal from Ottoman troops.

2 days later NZ had its first combat fatality when Private William HAM died as a result of wounds received in that action.

On the 25th April this year we commemorated the centenary of the landing of the Anzac forces at Gallipoli and remembered the many lives lost during that ill-fated campaign.


On the 8th August whilst we recalled the capture of Chunuk Bair we also again remembered the many lives that were lost of men from our district.

The lives lost of many either killed in action, or died from wounds or disease, and lives and families changed forever because their loved ones were never coming home and many others changed because of severe wounds to their husbands and sons.

Whilst we remembered these men that fell at Gallipoli we also remember those of the 10 NZ Nurses which lost their lives when the *Marquette* was sunk on the 23 October 1915 and the losses which continued until the final evacuation from the Dardanelles between the 15th and 20th December 1915.

We also recalled and remember those many more lives that were lost during campaigns in France and Belgium until the conclusion of WW1 when the Armistice came into effect 97 years ago.

However as we all well know now, what was known in 1918 as The Great War – the so called war to end all wars - that was not the case for 21 years later the world was once again in turmoil against a determined foe as men and women fought for justice and peace. WW2 had begun in 1939 and raged for 6 long years.



The Second World War took our nation to the very brink, to the edge of the precipice. People were all too conscious of what was at risk, and the extreme cost of overcoming that risk. We thank God that our civilization came out of it, but we must not forget the price.

You can write those things in great big terms - politics, government, civil freedoms, and the like – but often they come home hardest in personal stories of individuals and families who never got over the war – women who lost their fiancés and didn't ever marry, men whose experiences haunted them and were never able to fit back into so-called normal life.

The twentieth century was a century of war – the statisticians tell us more people died in that century in war than all the other centuries put together.

Many, many of those conflicts simply reassert the cruelty and folly of humanity - yes, they were dark, dark periods in our history, but amongst that darkness was an eagerness to look to the brightening light of a new day. We don't belong to the dark, we belong to the day. The gospel of peace and the shield of faith is the armour we seek.


Some years ago a Poppy Appeal overseas in the UK had the slogan, "*The best way to honour the dead, is to care for the living.*" I think the Royal British Legion got it exactly right.

We look back in thankfulness for deliverance, but that remembering is only worth anything, if we are doing something with what the struggle of the wars saved for us.

WW1 COMMITTEE

The Gore RSA will be 100 years in Sept 2017 and the executive have engaged the services of Doug Wing to write our history over these years.

Doug has written 6 books on district or family centennials and is now wanting material and information for our centennial book. PLEASE we need your help, especially past and present members of executive and committees.

Displays in our museum will be changed in the NEW YEAR.

EARLY BEGINNINGS OF THE GORE RSA by Doug Wing

With a growing concern that the affairs and interests of soldiers returning from overseas service needed a body that would advocate on their behalf, a New Zealand Returned Soldiers' Association was established at a meeting held in Wellington on 26th April 1916. Following this meeting, branches of the Association were progressively set up throughout the country.

Just prior to the first National Conference of the NZRSA, held in Dunedin from 25-29th May 1917, moves were made to form a branch of the Association in Gore. On 16th May 1917 a meeting was held under the chairmanship of E.R. Bowler, to form an Association in Gore to be called the Gore Returned Soldiers' Association and to be affiliated with the New Zealand Returned Soldiers' Association in Wellington. The Gore RSA was incorporated by September of 1917 and in March 1918 it received its notice of affiliation with the New Zealand Association.

Formation of a local Soldier's Club for both Gore and surrounding districts Returned Soldiers was one of the first matters the Gore RSA focused its attention on. After much support from locals through donations and fund-raising events, a soldiers club was operating in upstairs premises on Main Street, Gore, before the first annual meeting of the Gore RSA was held in April 1918.


A sub-association was formed at Mataura and sub-committees were formed at Balfour, Mandeville, Pukerau, Riversdale, Waikaia, and Waikaka in early 1920.

From those early beginnings, the Gore RSA has grown substantially with the first objectives of the Association principally the same today as they were when the Association was first established.

As the Gore RSA approaches 100 years since its formation, the Centennial Committee is undertaking research to record the history of the branch together with the sub-branches. We are appealing to all members for any information/photos etc. that may relate to events or is connected with the Association to bring it forward so that a complete story of the first 100 years can be told. Often it is the stories behind an event that often prove to be the hidden gems.

The topics we are looking at, but not limited to, are:

- The sub-branches and their histories for which there are a few records in Gore;
- Club Rooms The establishment of and renovations that have been undertaken plus activities, events, entertainments, etc., held;
- Monuments the building of plus any commemorative plaques/lists, war memorabilia, items etc.;



- Welfare of returned soldiers and/or their dependants, land settlement issues, obtaining of pensions, etc. with support from the Association;
- Any activities undertaken from by the Branch and/or Sub-Branches;
- Personnel who have fulfilled a role within the association or who may have contributed in some way with or with an interesting tale to tell that adds to the Associations story.

NEW ZEALAND AT WAR - 70 YEARS AGO

- Aug 194516,000 as part of a commonwealth force for the invasion of Japan. VJ Day. Celebrations occur
throughout New Zealand. All offensive action against Japan ends. Over 7,000 New Zealanders
in the Royal Navy and Royal New Zealand Navy in World War II. 573 were killed and 170
wounded.
- Sept 1945 Casualties for the RNZAF in the Pacific Campaign totalled 407: 345 killed, 58 wounded, 4 prisoners of war (3 died while prisoners of war. Hostilities end officially with the signing of the instruments of surrender aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo. Internationally, executions of accused collaborators begins in France and there is a food crisis in Britain.
- Oct 1945 the return of the New Zealand Veterans is the main topic of discussion in NZ. A memorial service is held by 2 NZEF at the war cemetery near the Sangro River and one near Cassino. New Zealand continues to disband squadrons who destroyed many aircraft, motor vehicles etc.
- **Nov 1945** a memorial service is held at the British War Cemetery.
- **Dec 1945** Members of 2 NZEF returning from overseas (209 officers and 257 other ranks) disembark from Mooltan at Wellington on the 20th and at Lyttleton the next day. Under the Maori war effort organisation, 5178 men were enlisted for overseas services, 2088 for home service and 10229 for the home guard a total of 17,495 enlistments. The December quarter of 1945 shows a maximum rate of demobilisation.

FROM THE OFFICE


December is shaping up to be a busy month with many functions booked in. We have entertainment every weekend leading up to Christmas and Shindig on New Year's Eve.
