The Veterans run to Winton was appreciated by those who came. Riding in the old cars was a day of reminiscing and a thank you to Winton for providing afternoon tea.



The man replies "I don't know, my wife told me to stand here."






CARDS – Gore RSA Flag 500




GORE RSA TRAVEL CLUB

THE PADRE PONDERING

Another year has passed and it won't be long until April arrives and so I've been thinking about Anzac Day 2016 where this year we will commemorate the centenary of the first Anzac Day service in 1916. Whilst this is a significant year it is also right and proper that we continue to remember and give thanks for the sacrifices made not just on that fateful day in 1915 but also those that have also been made in the ensuing years in order to continue to preserve the values of democracy and freedom from tyranny and oppression.

We will commemorate and celebrate the centenary of the Gore R.S.A. next year and as part of on-going research into our organisation I recently came across an article relating to Anzac Day by the Rev. Thomas H Eccersall that appeared in *The Mataura Ensign* of 24th April 1926. The article entitled 'The Epic Immortal – Why Anzac?' was directed toward young people as a way of explaining how and why WW1 started and what lead to the landings by New Zealand soldiers at Gallipoli 11 years earlier.

I believe that this article is worthy of reprinting in its entirety, and thus be helpful to us as grandparents when trying to explain the reason for WW1 and Anzac Day to our young people, just as this article was 90 years ago in 1926 when the effects of war was still fresh in the minds of all.

Tomorrow marks the eleventh anniversary of one of the greatest events in the history of the people of New Zealand and Australia. Viz., the landings of the civilian soldiers of these dominions upon the shores of Gallipoli.

Now it happened this way. Away over in the distant land of Austria there had been a great unrest amongst the people for some years. Secret societies came into existence, the members of which gave much trouble to the authorities. One day a certain student killed one of the members of the Royal family by shooting him. Instead of searching into the matter and bringing the criminal to justice, suspicion and intrigue led to wild statements being made about the other crowned heads and countries and what are called "international complications" arose. Although our ambassador (Sir Edward Grey) a noble man did all that he possibly could to keep the peace, he was unable to withstand these monarchs declaring war. So we find in the year 1914 the greatest war in history burst forth upon the world. Austria, Hungary, Germany, Turkey, Romania and all the Balkan States, with France, Italy Russia, and Belgium and later on America were all engaged in this big world war. Germany in order to reach France and inflict a crushing blow at the enemy tried to rush a great army of many thousands of soldiers through Belgium. Now Belgium was neutral, that is to say she was not on either side and had not entered that war.

Great Britain had entered into a solemn pact with the Belgians to protect their country and people against any enemy invasion, and when the German soldiers came pouring into her land, spreading death and destruction and desolation upon people and country, she immediately appealed to Britain to come and help her.

The British King called his Ministers and Parliament together and after carefully considering the situation immediately sent ships of war and soldiers to the assistance of the Belgians, who by this time were greatly oppressed by the German invaders. There our brave soldiers joined their French allies and together they fought the foe. Ever so many died in their defence of home and Empire whilst others were broken for life.

By this time the war had spread over many parts of the world, both on sea and land and the King called for volunteer soldiers from other parts of the Empire to come the assistance of the Motherland, and so many of Great Britain's sons and daughters answered the call. The women went to nurse the sick and wounded and help in many other ways; the men to see duty on both land and sea.

So it came to pass that on this day April 25, eleven years ago, many of Britain's sons from various Dominions landed amidst a storm of shot and shell that was rained from the enemy guns at a place at Gallipoli, and after making the place safe by driving the foeman back, stores were landed for the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps.

But instead of printing these names in full upon the cases of stores and equipment, the officials just put the first capital letter of each word, for of course every soldier who handled the transport of these goods knew what the letters ANZAC stood for.

So that is the way the name ANZAC came into existence but the fair fame and glory that makes the name so dear to every member of the British Empire is the story of suffering, heroism and dauntless courage, as well as the powerful spirit of comradeship that existed among these wonderful soldiers, who lived together, toiled together, suffered together, and in

death were not divided. The place where they landed to meet the hardy foeman is called "Anzac Cove," and will ever be a reminder of the suffering and service rendered to our Empire by her sons in her time of need. It remains for us to remember those who made the sacrifice, with reverence and thanksgiving.

I do hope that you found find this article both helpful and useful and please share it with the young people in your lives in order that they perhaps get a better understanding of WW1 and the Anzac's - Lest we forget - Wishing you and your family every blessing. – *Padre Bruce*

One person in ten of New Zealand's then population of 1,000,000 served overseas during the First World War, of whom more than 18,000 died and over 40,000 were wounded.

During the First World War Centenary, learn more about New Zealand's involvement on the Western Front and about the opportunity to attend the 100th anniversary commemorations of the Battle of Longueval (Somme Offensive) in September 2016 and the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Passchendaele in October 2017.


RAFFLES

NEW ZEALAND AT WAR - 70 YEARS AGO

POST WAR The victors realised they would not have a golden age of peace. Victory in Europe bought an end to European primacy in World affairs and a slow death to European colonial Empires. On 1st September 1951, the ANZUS agreement, a tripartite security treaty between Australia, New Zealand and the US was signed. This treaty promised consultations between signatories and mutual assistance. The Japanese peace treaty was signed on 8th September. The USSR did not sign. The 49 nations that did were intent on ending the war with Japan, without sowing seeds for future hostilities. This was so history wouldn't repeat itself.


JAN 1946 2 NZEF and HQ 2 NZ Division were disbanded. 28 (Maori) Battalion disembarks in New Zealand. The New Zealand Government is informed of an agreement that a Commonwealth force drawn from the UK, Australia, NZ and India will join US forces in the occupation of Japan.

FEB 1946 J Force, a 4,320-Man unit, is raised from 9 Brigade of 2 NZEF for occupation duties in Japan.

MAR 1946 No. 14 Fighter Squadron, with Corsair airplanes, arrives in Japan for duties with the Commonwealth Occupation Force.

MAY 1946 the first post-war flight to the Chatham Islands is made by an RNZAF Sutherland flying boat.

J Force assumes control of the Yamaguchi prefecture in Honshu (Population 1.3million).
