2018 sees us celebrating our 100th ANZAC day service in Gore as well as the 100th Anniversary of Armistice day, so stay tuned for updates on both these events.


Sadly 2017 has seen us lose some our members and I wish to convey my condolences to all the families that have lost a loved one in the past year.

# INTRODUCING OUR NEW SUPPORT OFFICER NIALL SHEPHARD

"Making pensions advice and welfare services easily accessible and widely available to all ex-service people, police and their families." is the by line, or motto that sits on the front cover of the RSA Welfare Trust brochure. Those few words encapsulate the reason why RSAs exist and why there are Support Advisors or Welfare Officers at each RSA.


The RSA's Support Services team may be able to help with applications or referrals to a number of trusts and agencies both in New Zealand and overseas. Funding may be available for services and support which aims to reduce hardship and suffering, for ex-service people, police, their spouses and dependent children or parents – the ex-service family.

Recognising the changing and growing nature of welfare support, Gore RSA recently contracted the services of Dunedin's full time Support Advisor, Niall Shepherd, to assist with complex cases and to augment the services offered by the existing volunteer visiting network. Based in Dunedin, Niall visits Gore regularly – usually on the first Monday of every month, and is available between visits by phone or email. Niall is well versed in the issues faced by the ex-service family and has an Army and Police background. He has also worked for Age Concern Otago, is a Justice of the Peace, and has been Welfare Officer / Support Advisor at Dunedin RSA Welfare Trust for the last 3 ½ years.

One of the biggest problems faced by Support Advisors across the country is identifying those eligible people who need assistance. There is no list of ex-service people, they no longer stand out because they wear a uniform, and they simply get absorbed into the greater community so unless they experience problems along the road of life they remain anonymous like everyone else. When a need starts to surface, often later in life, it can be very hard for people to ask for help. There are many reasons for this; a certain amount of pride could be involved, perhaps some embarrassment, lack of knowledge of what is available, desire not to be a burden, stubbornness, or simply the refusal to accept the need for help.

If you or anyone you know from the ex-service family is struggling there is no shame in putting your hand up for help. Our Support Services team is available to help make those **BIG** problems smaller. Grant funding, referrals to appropriate agencies and services, advocacy and advice are just some of the support services freely available.

Well here we are at the end of another year. We have had some great trips throughout the year travelling around Southland and to Dunedin, enjoying lovely meals in restaurants and hotels.


Our last outing for the year is our Christmas Dinner on 19<sup>th</sup> November and for a change we are going out of Gore for this meal.

#### THE PADRE PONDERING

It has certainly been a very busy year, the last few months have simply flown by and it only seems more like a few weeks rather than months since we gathered together for Anzac Day. In September we celebrated the centenary of the Gore R.S.A as well as commemorating with a special remembrance service for this and remembering the losses at Passchendaele.

Now it is already November and of course another Remembrance/Armistice Day service and then we have Christmas now only a matter of some weeks away. Where indeed has the year gone!

Some of you will be aware that over the last few years I have been researching the names inscribed on the numerous war memorials in Southland and West Otago. This is still very much 'work in progress' to identify the right people and then researching their service and other details such as their occupation and parentage and any obituaries that may have been written. Whilst there is still way to go with this project I thought that you may be interested in some rather sobering facts concerning the names inscribed on the marble panels on the Gore memorial of 171 men who died as a result of their service during WW1 and WW2.


Of these 171 war casualty names 126 are for WW1 and 45 are for WW2, with the youngest being aged 18 years for WW1 and 20 years for WW2 and the oldest being aged 48 years and the average age for both wars being 26 years.

Of the 126 WW1 names: 78 were KIA (killed in action), 29 DOW (died of wounds), 17 DOD (died of disease) and 2 as result of accidents.

Of the 45 WW2 names: 37 were KIA, 4 DOW, 2 DOD and also 2 as a result of accidents.

Looking at the WW1 casualties who were either KIA or DOW there were 20 as a result of the Gallipoli campaign and 14 from the Somme and 32 from the Ypres battles including 11 on that fateful day at Passchendaele on 12 October 1917.

Looking at the WW2 casualties who were either KIA or DOW there were 10 as a result of action in the middle east countries of Egypt, Tunisia & Libya, in the Mediterranean countries; 3 in Greece, 7 in Crete and 9 in Italy. There were also 9 casualties in Europe as a result of action involving those serving in the Airforce and 2 in the Pacific. Looking at the nationalities of those 126 casualties from WW1: there were 5 born in Australia, 3 born



in England, 3 born in Scotland and 2 born in Ireland. The rest of course were all noted as being born in N.Z. and mainly local but also from various places in Southland, Otago and Canterbury.

On a more sobering and even sadder aspect of the WW1 casualties eight families lost more than one son, namely the Davies from Gore who lost 3 sons (2 of them within 24 hours of each other), and seven other local families who each lost 2 sons, surnames of Fleming, Inglis, Kirk, Milne, Sim, Turnbull and Wilson. Such indeed was the cost of freedom!

On the Gore memorial there are 3 names from WW1 that initially caused me some confusion and has taken quite some time to try and unravel the mystery surrounding them.


One name shown as L Byars, and of course the surname is well known locally, however after discovering no locals of that surname served during WW1 posed a quandary. Eventually the answer came in the form of Leonard Angus Bowers, he was born at Stewart Island and educated at Bluff, however his widowed mother was living at East Gore and a sister later married in Gore and his proper name of Bowers is also shown on the Mataura memorial.

Another name shown as T Sharp also posed a problem as he wasn't listed as having served during WW1, however it appears that he was about the enlist and was on his way up north but was killed whilst trying to board a train at Pukerau. Tom Sharp was born at Denniston, educated in Tasmania but returned to N.Z. where was an employee of N.Z.Railways, he had a military funeral in Gore and in excess of 1000 people attended his funeral.

The last but not least name proved to be the strangest to resolve, that being shown as C Lindsay – Initially this was supposed to be Charles Lindsay who was noted on his parents headstone at Gore cemetery as "Charlie William only son of Charles Lindsay d 2 Nov 1915 on HMNZ Troopship Navua – This has proved so far to be false as there appears to be no record of a person of this name has having died on that day aboard the Navua. However there was another NZ soldier named Gordon Rowland Jefferis who died aboard the Navua and was indeed buried at sea that day.

We recently came across an Honours Board for the Gore Orange Lodge which showed a Bros Andrew John Lindsay who was KIA at the Somme in 1916 and with obvious Gore or local connections is now possibly our best guess as to whom is our mysterious C Lindsay. However if anyone reading this has other ideas as to this person I would be very pleased to hear from them and also I am very happy to share whatever information that we have about the names on our war memorials and honours boards and the Gore R.S.A. welcomes any enquiries you may have.



Again this year, we welcomed two new members to the Golf Section.


We are looking for more members and would welcome them into the group.


#### GORE RSA SNOOKER SECTION




#### **RAFFLES**
